TOPTIPS FOR EXPLORERS

Caen Hill Locks were built over 200 years ago. John Rennie, the canal engineer, wanted the Kennet & Avon Canal to take the shortest route - uphill! To do this, he built a giant flight of locks.

massive side pond that holds as much water as two Olympic-sized swimming pools! Without them, the canal would run out of water.

Today, they attract loads of wildlife.

Walk to Stop 1

Find some stony ground, long grass or hedgerow.

Collect four small stones and use them to mark
the corners of a square of about 30 cms. Find
a short stick to gently lift up stones and poke
around leaves.



Collect some leaves. Look for long thin ones, large ones, small ones, spotty ones, prickly ones for your own natural history museum.





Look on the benches by the top side pond. Can you find the name of the last lock keeper to live in the cottage? His name was


