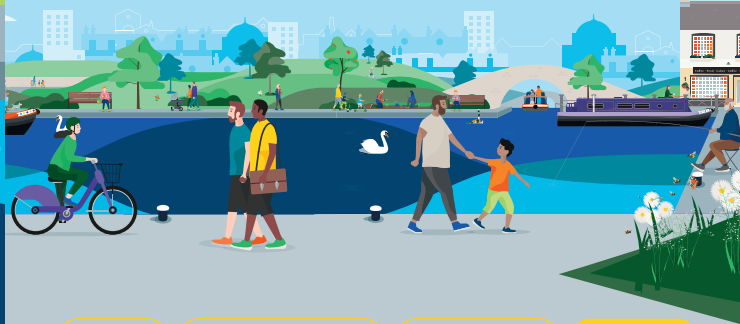
Making life better by water

Keeping history alive

Opening in 1846, Albert Dock transformed the way docks worked. Its warehouses were fireproof and secure, and hydraulic cranes hauled heavy cargoes helping to cut the time it took to unload and turn ships around in half.

By the 1970s, the dock was silted and unused. In 1981, the Merseyside Development Corporation was established to regenerate the city's waterfront and docks. Following a £22 million facelift, Liverpool Canal Link opened to boats in 2009, extending the canal from Stanley Dock Lock Flight to the South Docks via Albert Dock.

5 things to do at Albert Dock & Liverpool Canal

- 1** Walk along the Liverpool Canal link to Pier Head, see if you can spot the Cunard Building and the Liver Birds atop the Royal Liver Building.
- 2** Visit the Museum of Liverpool, the Maritime Museum and the International Slavery Museum and learn how the docks shaped the history of the city, the country and the world.
- 3** Take a trip on the world-famous Mersey Ferry.
- 4** Enjoy world-class art at Tate Liverpool.
- 5** Pause for a drink or bite to eat at Albert Dock and enjoy some time by water.

Did you know?

Albert Dock was awarded Grade I listed status in 1952 and is the largest single collection of Grade I listed buildings in the country'.
