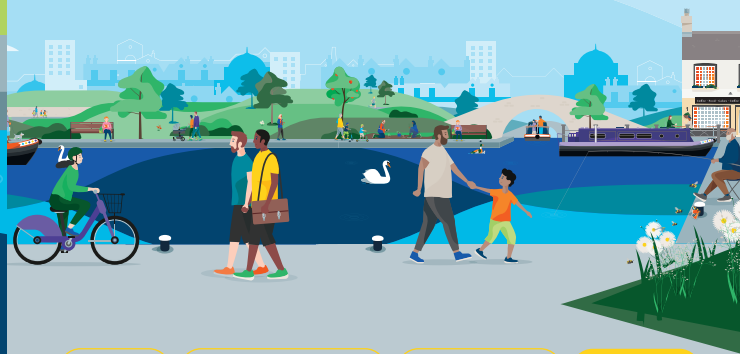

The Grand Union Canal was once one of Britain's key transport routes. It links London with Birmingham and at 137 miles (220km) is the longest canal in the country.

This canal isn't one single waterway. Between 1894 and 1929 several independent canals were amalgamated to create the Grand Union Canal. The term 'Grand Union' is now generally taken to mean the stretch of canal from the Thames at Brentford to the junction with the Digbeth Branch in Birmingham.

It's difficult to believe that this quaint village was once a hive of industry, where boatmen stopped for supplies or loaded up with cargo before heading into the 2 mile (3km) long Blisworth Tunnel.

5 things to do at Stoke Bruerne

- 1 Visit the free museum and learn more about the canal and its people.
- 2 Take a boat trip into the historic Blisworth Tunnel – in the early days of canals, boats had to be 'legged' through the tunnel while the horse was led over the top.
- 3 Chat with our friendly volunteer lock keepers, they'll tell you more about the canal and how you can volunteer.
- 4 Enjoy a coffee and watch the boats make their way along the canal.
- 5 Visit the historic workboat moored outside the canal museum.

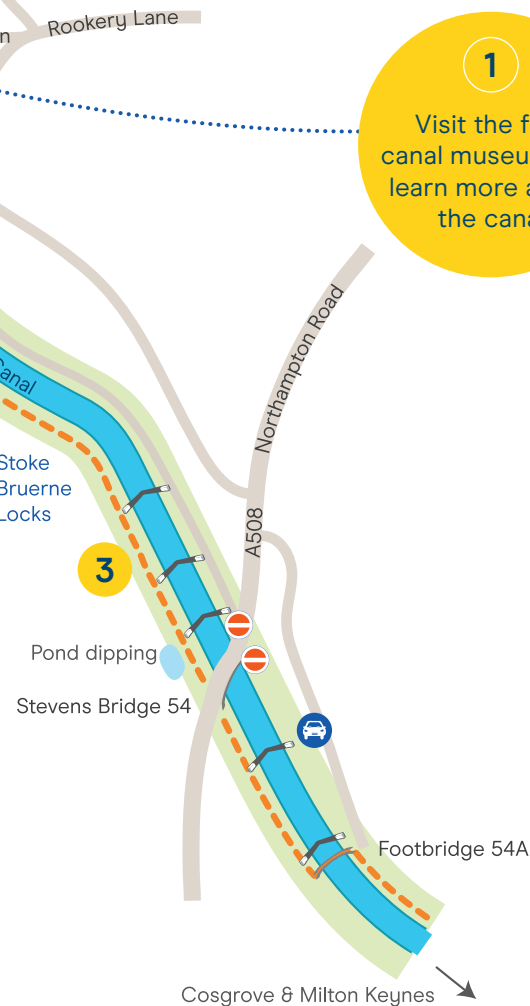

Blisworth Tunnel is the third-longest navigable canal tunnel in the UK and the ninth-longest canal tunnel in the world.
