Keeping history alive

Opened in 1797, Weston Turville Reservoir was built to compensate local millers for the loss of water diverted from their mills to the Wendover Arm of the Grand Union canal.

Over the years, many wetland plants have grown around the edges of the reservoir and the area is now a Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI).

Berkshire, Buckinghamshire and Oxfordshire Wildlife Trust looks after the surrounding land which includes a marshy fen, extensive reedbeds, areas of scrub and woodland.

5 things to do at Weston Turville Reservoir

- 1 Take binoculars and see the different water birds, during the winter you can spot teal, shoveler and tufted duck, and even the occasional bittern.
- **2 Enjoy** a gentle jog or walk along the 2km (1.2 mile) pathway that circles the reservoir.
- **3 Go** fishing, the reservoir is teeming with all kinds of fish remember to get a licence first.
- 4 Pause to watch the boats from Aylesbury Sailing Club tacking and gybing across the water.
- 5 Simply relax, immerse yourself in the beauty of the nature reserve and enjoy being by water.

Did you know?

The reservoir is a regular breeding site for the water rail. As well as having a distinctive orange beak, the water rail has an extensive repertoire of sounds including grunts, groans, 'purrs' and 'piglet squeals'.
