

ISLINGTON VISITOR MOORINGS MANAGEMENT PLAN: November 2013

19 NOVEMBER 2013

1. INTRODUCTION

This management plan is designed to address the conflicts arising from noise and smoke pollution at the Islington Visitor Moorings, to the rear of Noel Road, Angel, Islington.

The plan results from a period of consultation with local residents, boater groups, and Islington Council. It presents the final management plan following feedback on proposals published on 20 September 2013, which closed for consultation on 4 October.

The plan is being implemented as a trial. It will be monitored continuously, and reviewed after four months (i.e. after 31st March 2014), to assess its impact and effectiveness. The implementation programme is shown in Section 5. Individual measures will be introduced on a step by step basis subject to commissioning (e.g. permanent signage, caretaker boaters) and other consents, with temporary measures installed in the interim.

2. OUR APPROACH

The response to the proposals of 20 September shows that views are polarised. While there is support for the principle of improving the management of the moorings, there is no consensus on how far any new measures should go. Local residents want tough restrictions which are unacceptable to boaters. Boaters are prepared to accept some restrictions, but do not accept that they need to be as draconian as residents request. The Trust has to make a balanced judgement and cannot satisfy everyone.

Having weighed the arguments from both sides very thoroughly, we have concluded that the sensible route is to focus on measures that have the greatest chance of achieving two key objectives:

- 1. Reduction in nuisance noise and smoke events at the visitor moorings
- 2. Greater turnover of boats visiting the moorings more genuine visitors making use of the moorings.

We will monitor progress using the measures proposed below and will publish monthly reports based on these, so both boaters and residents and measure change.

3. SUMMARY OF MEASURES

The management measures to be implemented are:

- Designation of the Islington Visitor Moorings as a Quiet Zone, including limiting engine and generator noise to background level
- Continued daily weekday (and occasional weekend) sightings of boats by our enforcement team with prompt warning letters where overstay or nuisance is identified
- Introduction of single line mooring in winter, maximum double berthing in summer
- Investigating recruiting monthly rotating 'Caretaker Boaters' to moor up, remaining in situ for 1
 month, to advise and provide information to boaters, report local incidents, and liaise with residents
 and agencies
- New signage to reinforce Quiet Zone messages and new mooring arrangements
- Deployment of two new two part-time Mooring Rangers to provide regular towpath presence, including weekends, to provide information, raise awareness of boating protocols, and implement mooring rules
- Investment in DEFRA funded project for an Environmental Health apprentice to provide boaters with environmental advice, training and assessments

These measures are described in Appendix 1.

4. IMPLEMENTATION

4.1 Measures to reduce noise and smoke events

- I) Increased communication with boaters, using a variety of channels including information and advice leaflets, new signage and face to face conversations with mooring rangers.
- II) Work with Islington Council environmental health team for them to advise on good practice in promoting and enforcing measures to reduce nuisance. Offer proactive training and support to all boaters at the moorings regarding switching to cleaner and quieter technology.
- III) Regular patrols of the moorings to assess compliance with the new mooring rules, communicate good practice, and record breaches of mooring rules and licence terms and conditions.
- IV) Provide early, formal warnings when advice goes unheeded, and gather evidence to underpin prosecution. In this we look to support from Islington Council which has expertise in recording and evaluation of evidence for prosecution.
- V) Proceed through process for enforcing licencing terms and conditions where formal warnings unheeded. The process provides for a 'probationary' period where further breaches may result in the loss of boat licence.
- VI) Introduce changes to mooring arrangements to limit the level of smoke and noise generated, particularly in winter, while maintaining capacity for visitors during the summer:
 - o 1st October 31st March single line berthing only
 - o 1st April to 30th September double line berthing permitted (no triple berthing permitted)

This will be linked to better communication with boaters to highlight stay durations, identify suitable alternative moorings, and inform about the boat sightings regime and enforcement procedures. Close links with our enforcement team will also enable non-compliance to be dealt with early.

How we will monitor progress

- Weekly monitoring of complaints and mooring ranger patrol records
- Number of formal warnings issued each month

- Number of open cases in evidence gathering process
- Weekly surveys of noise and smoke events completed by Noel Road residents' representatives, subject to residents' support:
 - Residents provided with a simple spreadsheet on which to record daily 'smoke' and 'noise' incidents, to be submitted weekly. CRT will use these to create monthly reports to assess the level of incidents experienced during the previous month.
 - This would not be in place of registering complaints, rather it is to gain a picture of whether issues are getting better or worse over a given period of time.
 - The survey would not need to include boat numbers, but these could be provided optionally. The survey is intended to provide a qualitative assessment of when, and for how long, nuisance has been experienced. The survey form would be structured to measure nuisance from air and noise pollution, with a subjective intensity rating from 1 to 5.
 - Submission of weekly surveys would be purely voluntary on the part of Noel Road residents. We would publish monthly statistics of the assessments and they would be a factor we would take into account in planning the next month's mooring ranger shift patterns, and in providing feedback to caretaker boaters.

4.2 Measures to increase the turnover of boats visiting the moorings

- I) Review stay durations and 'no return' rule after trial period
 - Keep the maximum stay time at 7 days for the trial period
 - On balance, based on the reassurance from responsible members of the boating community that the great majority of boaters would have greater respect for the less authoritarian approach, we have decided that for an initial four month trial, we will not specify return rules.
 - This site is designated as a 'Visitor Mooring', which is a short term mooring designed to manage demand at popular locations. The term 'visitors' can include a wide range of boats, from those with a home mooring to continuous cruisers travelling the network, to those who predominantly spend their time in London. Leisure visitors are generally either boaters from further afield spending a relatively short period in the capital, or boaters with a London home mooring generally making short leisure cruises. We would not want to restrict the frequency with which leisure and occasional visitors to the Capital can use the moorings (unless we identify that they do not regularly return to their home mooring, in which case we will deal with the matter as a potential false home mooring declaration).
- II) Enforcement against boats that are moving insufficiently
 - O Boaters have pointed out that continuous cruisers which account for the largest volume of boats in London must in any case make a continuous journey that prevents them from frequent return visits. We are implementing a programme of enforcement against boats which are not navigating sufficiently to satisfy our guidance for licence holders, focussing initially on those who move the least. This will extend to other boats that are not moving sufficiently. Linked to our work on identifying and opening up other, under-used stretches of the canal for mooring, this will, over time manage the level of return visits.

How we will monitor progress

- Monthly monitoring of usage of moorings (see Appendix 4), using Key Performance Indicators relating to the numbers of different boats sighted on the mooring analysed by:
 - o those with a home mooring outside greater London
 - those with a home mooring in greater London
 - continuous cruisers sighted in London or the South East during <u>7 or more</u> of the past 12 months (proxy for London based continuous cruiser)

 continuous cruisers sighted in London or the South East during <u>6 or fewer</u> of the past 12 months (proxy for continuous cruiser not based in London)

5. NEXT STEPS

This management plan is being implemented on a trial basis to monitor its impact and effectiveness. The following actions constitute implementation of the plan:

- o Mooring ranger patrols November 2013 (already under way)
- Mooring restriction notices November 2013
- o Information/advice leaflet produced and distributed November 2013
- Noise and smoke survey designed and launched November 2013
- o Permanent signage in place December 2013
- o Caretaker boater recruited and on site December 2013
- o First monthly reports of noise/smoke survey and moorings usage December 2013
- Review of trial mid-April 2014

- education about how to protect boaters' own health from diesel and smoke emissions
- identifying best practice measures for operating diesel engines
- disseminating and sharing findings on best practice with boaters, local residents, and other local authorities.


