Keeping history alive

Earlswood is actually made up of three 22-acre reservoirs – Terry's Pool, Windmill Pool and Engine Pool. The lakes (or reservoirs) were originally built in the 1820s to supply water to the Stratford-upon-Avon Canal.

The network of channels alongside the lakes enabled water to be moved from the River Blythe to the canal or the lakes.

The lakes took nearly five years to complete and cost £297,000, equivalent to approximately £34 million today.

5 things to do at Earlswood Lakes

- 1 Enjoy the 2.6 miles (4.2km) easy accessible walking trail around the lakes.
- **Discover** the variety of wildlife in the area including woodpeckers, kestrels, owls, otters and muntjack deer.
- 3 Learn to sail or just relax and watch others at Earlswood Lakes Sailing Club enjoying their time on water.
- 4 Follow the path to the Old Engine House, once used to pump water into the canal feeder channel.
- 5 Have a picnic and feel the benefit of spending time by water.

Did you know?

Anglers discovered a 33 pound (16 kilo) Aligator Snapping Turtle, a critically endangered species, in the Engine Pool in 2008. It can now be seen at West Midlands Safari Park where it is part of a captive breeding programme.
