Keeping history alive

This stretch of the Shropshire Union Canal was once known as the Chester Canal.

In 1770 it was proposed that a canal should be built from the River Dee in Chester to the Trent ϑ Mersey Canal at Middlewich, creating a short-cut route between the Potteries and Liverpool. However, due to engineering issues, costs and a lack of support from the Trent ϑ Mersey Canal Company, the Chester Canal terminated at Nantwich.

In 1813, the Ellesmere Canal Company merged with the Chester Canal Company. Then in 1847 the Ellesmere Canal, Birmingham & Liverpool Junction Canal and the Montgomeryshire Canal came together to form the Shropshire Union Railways and Canal Company and the waterway became known as the Shropshire Union Canal.

5 things to do in Chester

- 1 Stroll along the towpath to Northgate Locks, carved out of solid sandstone and the deepest in the country.
- 2 See King Charles' Tower (also known as Pheonix Tower) it is said that King Charles I stood on the tower as he watched his soldiers being defeated at the Battle of Rowton Heath.
- Walk to Tower Wharf to see a working boatyard and dry dock, and old canal warehouses.
- **4 Enjoy** a boat trip along the city's famous River Dee.
- 5 Cycle along the towpath to Chester Zoo.

Did you know?

The Bridge of Sighs was used to take condemned prisoners from the city gaol to the former Chapel of St John on the other side of the canal. Here, they would receive their last rites before being led back to the gallows.
