Keeping history alive

Designed by Thomas Telford, the Llangollen Canal was originally known as the Ellesmere Canal and was Telford's last major engineering project.

The intention was to create a link between the ports of Liverpool and Bristol and create better trade routes between north-east Wales and the manufacturing heartlands of the West Midlands. While rising costs meant this ambition was never realised, several major civil engineering feats were accomplished with the creation of two 'rivers in the sky' at Chirk and Pontcysyllte.

Today, the waterway is one of the most popular canals for boaters and more boats travel along the waterway than did when it was used for industry.
