Keeping history alive

When building the Kennet & Avon Canal, engineer John Rennie encountered a major engineering challenge - how to ensure a ready supply of water to the western end of the waterway.

The problem was solved with the construction of a pumping station, with two steam pumps pumping water 40ft (12m) to the summit of the canal. At the time it was a tremendous feat of engineering and engineers went on to use the technology to drain mines and supply towns and cities with water throughout the world.

Crofton Pumping Station is owned by the Kennet ϑ Avon Canal Trust.



5 things to do at Crofton

- Visit the pumping station and see the engines 'in steam' - see croftonbeamengines.org for details of steam days.
- 2 Visit Wilton Water - Rennie created this reservoir to supply water to the pumping station.
- 3 **Enjoy** a traffic-free cycle ride along the towpath to Bruce Tunnel - it is named after Earl Ailsbury, the local landowner who insisted on a tunnel for the canal instead of a deep cut (1.3 miles/2km).
- Have a canal-side picnic and enjoy spending time by water.
- Stroll along the towpath watching the many different boats making their way along the canal.

Did you know?

The 1812 Boulton & Watt steam-powered beam engine in Crofton Pumping Station is the oldest working beam engine in the world.
