Keeping history alive

In 1768 renowned canal engineer, James Brindley won the contract to build a canal between Coventry and the Trent & Mersey Canal at Fradley. Unfortunately, the scheme ran out of money a year later when works reached Atherstone, 21 miles (34km) from Fradley, where 11 locks were needed.

The Coventry Canal was eventually completed in 1789 by the Trent & Mersey Canal Company and the Birmingham & Fazeley Canal Company.
