Keeping history alive

When it opened in 1810, the Kennet & Avon Canal brought prosperity to the towns along its route, providing a faster, cheaper and safer way to transport goods between Bristol and London.

Wharves were constructed at key staging points along the canal to allow boats to load and unload goods and passengers. There were once seven wharves at Devizes, this last remaining wharf is an important part of the town's history. It provides a connection to its industrial past and a gateway to the wildlife and nature that can now be found along the waterway.



5 things to do at Devizes Wharf

- **Follow** the canal down to Caen Hill lock flight, one of the wonders of the waterways (1 mile/1.6km).
- 2 Visit the museum, housed in a bonded warehouse where goods were stored before duties were paid.
 - Watch the colourful canal boats navigate their way through the locks.

- **Enjoy** a stroll along the canal and spot the signs of history – from the grooves worn by wet tow ropes on Cemetery Road Bridge to the WWII pill box.
- 5 See the arch on the far side of Town Bridge – this allowed horses towing the boats to pass through.

Did you know?

The Kennet & Avon Canal was part of the Government's 'General Head Quarters Line' during World War II – a static defensive line designed to hold back Hitler's troops in the event of an invasion. As part of these defences, a number of squat concrete pillboxes, like the one at Devizes, were built along the canal.
