Keeping history alive

The 46-mile (74km) long Chesterfield Canal opened in 1777. It was one of the last canals designed by James Brindley, who died while it was being constructed.

The canal links the River Trent at West Stockwith in Nottinghamshire with Chesterfield in Derbushire. There are two tunnels on the main canal - one 2.6km long at Norwood, and this short 140m one at **Drakeholes**

Today the towpath along the canal is a long-distance footpath and cycle route.

- Walk along the canal towards
 Wiseton to see the Grade II listed
 Lady's Bridge, also known as Old
 Man or Man Face Bridge.
- **2 Bring** a picnic and enjoy the benefits of spending some time by water.
- 3 Look out for the array of wildlife including damselflies and dragonflies.
- 4 Stroll along to the entrance of Drakeholes Tunnel where the towpath stops before they had engines, boats had to be 'legged' through the tunnel.
- 5 Take a moment to pick up any litter and help us to keep our canals and towpath clean.

Did you know?

The Chesterfield Canal is known as 'Cuckoo Dyke' after the cargo boats called 'cuckoos' that used to work on this waterway.
