#### Keeping history alive

Chirk Aqueduct opened in 1801. It was built by Thomas Telford and William Jessop to carry the Ellesmere Canal, (the original name of the Llangollen Canal) over the River Ceiriog.

The Llangollen Canal stretches from Llangollen to Hurleston Junction. While boat traffic on the canal had ceased by 1939, the canal and two aqueducts remained open, taking water from the River Dee to Hurleston Reservoir where it provides drinking water for people living in Crewe and Nantwich.

We're the charity making life better by water

Cross the England-Wales border in mid-air! This is one of only a few places on our waterways network where you can stand with one foot in England and one foot in Wales as the canal straddles the border between the two countries.



## 5 things to do at Chirk Aqueduct

- 1 Enjoy a picnic by the Llangollen Canal, one of the most scenic waterways in Britain.
- 2 Stroll across Chirk Aqueduct, 21ft (70m) above the River Ceiriog.
- **Take** a walk along the river path and look up at Chirk Viaduct built by Scottish engineer Henry Robertson and opened in 1848.
- 4 Pack a torch and walk through Chirk Tunnel.
- 5 Visit Chirk Castle, cared for by the National Trust, it was completed in 1310 and is now surrounded by parkland.

### Did you know?

The stretch of canal from the Welsh border at Chirk Aqueduct to Gledrid Bridge is a Scheduled Ancient Monument. Together with Pontcysyllte Aqueduct, Chirk Aqueduct is part of the Llangollen Canal World Heritage site, which stretches from Chirk to the Horseshoe Falls in Llangollen.
