Keeping history alive

Once a small rural village, Kintbury's fortunes changed in 1794 with the arrival of hundreds of 'navvies' constructing the Kennet & Avon Canal.

Kintbury was the first section of the Kennet & Avon Canal to be opened. The canal was the main trading route between London and Bristol, and the wharf thrived for 100 years.

Large quantities of iron and coke bound for the local ironworks were unloaded at the wharf, as well as raw materials for nearby breweries.

5 things to do at Kintbury

Did you know?

The Kennet & Avon Canal opened in 1810. By 1818 there were 200 barges working on the waterway. It took an average of 3 days and 9 hours to travel from Newbury to Bath.
