### Keeping history alive

The arrival of the canal in 1814 brought new opportunities to the area. Welford Wharf started supplying local people with coal and wool, and local produce was 'exported' to other towns and cities along the canal.

Seven lime kilns were also built alongside the canal. These were used to burn the limestone quarried nearby to make lime. This was used in lime mortar for the construction industry and spread as fertiliser on the land.

#### 5 things to do at Welford Wharf

- Put your walking boots on and venture along a stretch of the Jurassic Way, a long-distance walk that passes through Welford Village, or try the three-mile circular walk around the Welford Arm.
- **2** Take a look at the remains of the lime kilns opposite the wharf.
- **3 Stroll** along the towpath to the lock and see the restored canal bridge (0.3 mile/0.5km).
- **Pack** binoculars and head to Welford Reservoir to spot waterbirds.
- **5** Take a break in the historic canal-side Wharf Inn or the tea room in Welford Village.

## Did you know?

At one time there were three mills along the Welford Arm – Bosworth Mill beside Bridge 1, Naseby Mill, and Welford Mill just before Welford Lock. Now, all that remains of the lift bridge that served the mill is a single wooden post.
