### Keeping history alive

The Monmouthshire Canal and the Brecknock & Abergavenny Canals were used to transport coal, limestone and agricultural products.

They were also extensively used by ironmasters and industrialists to take raw iron ore from Newport to Llanfoist Wharf. Remains of this heritage, including wharves and lime kilns, can still be seen along the canal today.

The two canals fell into decline in the early part of the 20th century. However, after years of campaigning, work got underway in 1968 to restore the stretch of canal from Brecon to Pontymoile.



## 5 things to do at Brecon Basin

- 5 Stroll along the towpath to see the old lime kilns.

### Did you know?

The 'Mon & Brec Canal' was originally two separate canals. The Monmouthshire Canal opened in 1799 and went from Newport to Pontymoile Basin, and the Brecknock & Abergavenny Canal from Pontymoile to Brecon which was completed in 1812.
