Keeping history alive

The Barrage was built as part of a wider regeneration project to improve the River Tees. The Barrage controls the river water flow and enables a host of watersports to be enjoyed. The improved water quality has also helped wildlife to flourish in the area.

Work started in 1991 and took four years to complete. It cost £55m and consists of four hydraulic rams weighing 21 tonnes. As well as controlling water levels, the Barrage also generates electricity.



Did you know?

You can spot two species of seal at the Tees Barrage. Common seals are smaller and have V-shaped nostrils. Grey seals are larger and have a sloping 'roman nose' profile. Two types of seal can be seen in the River Tees. Despite their name, common seals are actually less common than grey seals.
