Keeping history alive

Local cotton spinners Martin Swindells and Joseph Brooke took advantage of the newly constructed Macclesfield Canal and sited their steam-powered mills – Clarence and Adelphi – alongside the waterway. This made it easier to transport goods to and from the mills.

By the 1890s the cotton industry was in decline, however during World War II Adelphi Mill was used to produce parachutes, and at the end of the 1960s it had been converted to produce webbing for car seatbelts until all spinning ceased in the late 1980s.

5 things to do at Clarence Mill & Adelphi Mill

- 1 Visit Bollington Discovery Centre to find out more about the Macclesfield Canal which opened in 1831 and Clarence Mill (built 1834).
- 2 Cycle along the towpath to see Adelphi Mill (built 1856).
- **3 Hire** a boat at Bollington Wharf and enjoy a cruise along the canal.
- 4 Take a look at Bollington Aqueduct built by Thomas Telford, the famous canal engineer.
- 5 Enjoy a waterside picnic and admire the impressive industrial heritage.

Did you know?

Local cotton spinner, Martin Swindells built the Adelphi Mill for his two sons, hence the name 'Adelphi' which is the Ancient Greek word for brothers.
