

Where does the water come from?

Much of the water in the Lancaster Canal comes from Killington Reservoir, feeding along Peasey Beck for 8 miles, before entering the canal

The Lancaster Canal north of Tewitfield Locks is not navigable, but transfers water to the navigable section

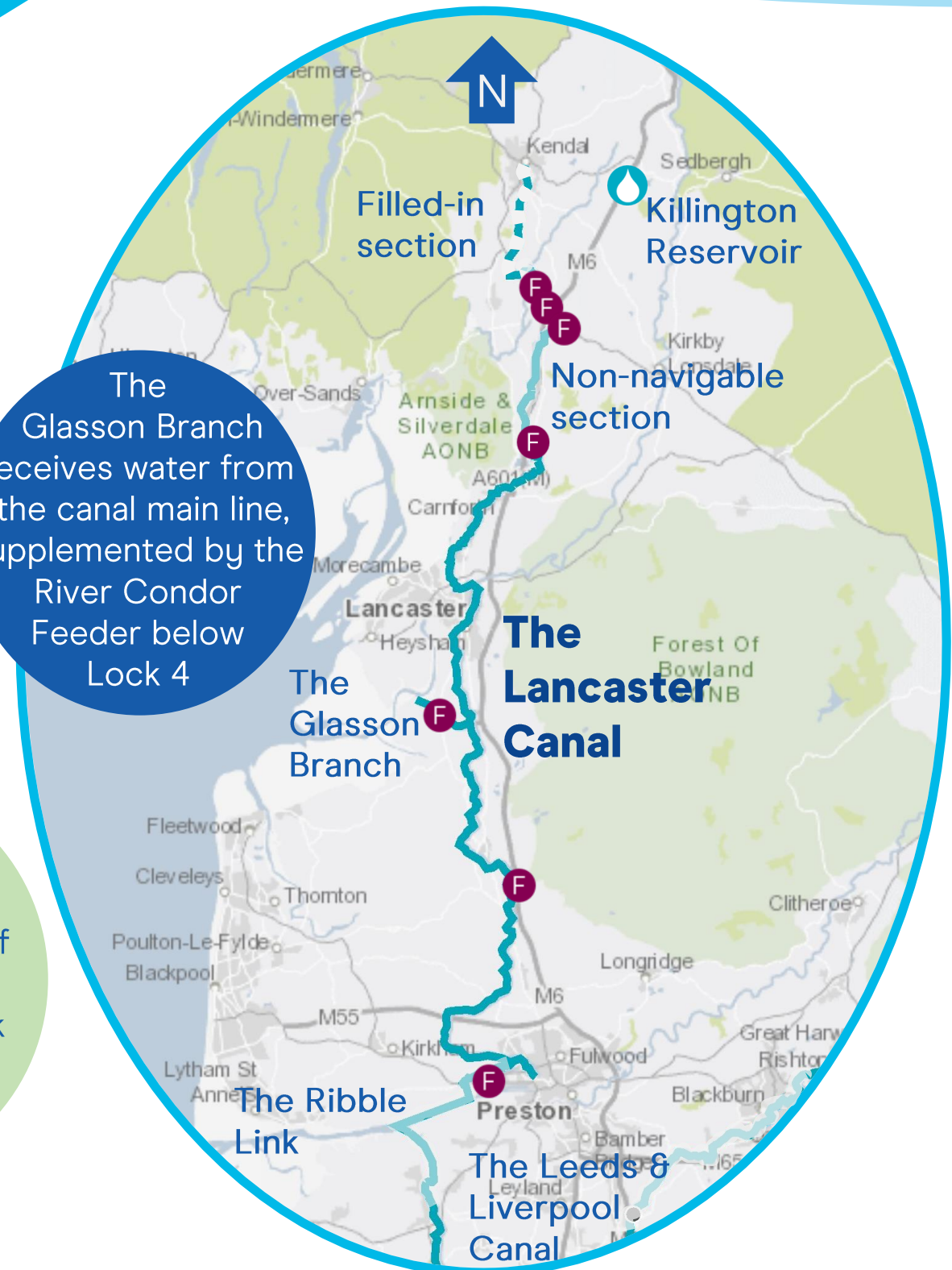
Many feeders (diverted streams) supply the canal, between them contributing about the same amount of water as the reservoir

The Glasson Branch receives water from the canal main line, supplemented by the River Condor Feeder below Lock 4

Locks 1-3 on the Ribble Link get their water from the Lancaster Canal, below lock 3 the water comes from Savick Brook

Work began constructing the canal before a southern link into the main canal network had been finalised

The Lancaster Canal was not joined to the rest of the canal network until the Ribble Link was completed in 2002
