


Create and Do: Map in a matchbox



Capture the things you see along your journey by mapping the things you find. It's a great way to sketch, draw or note what you see and find out more when you get home. The map will unfold to reveal all the things you discovered on your journey.

You will need:

- Matchbox
- Strip of paper just wide enough to fit inside the match box – it can be as long as you like, providing it fits inside the box when folded (see our templates overleaf)
- · Pencil or pen

What to do

- Divide the strip of paper into sections which are just slightly shorter than the length of the matchbox (see template over page – you could use this and sellotape several together).
- Use the lines as a guide to fold the strip of paper into a concertina.
- Glue one end of the strip into the bottom of the box, and fold the rest to fit inside the box.
- Make a note or sketch the things that interest you as you walk or cycle along by the waterway.
- There are so many species of wildlife and plants to see, but if you look closely you might see animal footprints, interesting leaf markings or an insect you haven't seen before. You could take note of smells and sounds, or canal structures such as a lock, aqueduct or weir.
- When you finish each section, re-fold your map back into the box.

Try this at home

- Who'd been there? Identify the footprints and find out more about the creature that made them to tell you more about why they like to live in their waterside habitat. Do they feed or live amongst any of the plants or trees you have sketched?
- Name that plant
 Find out the latin and common name for the plants you have sketched.
- Find out more
 If you were fascinated by
 the structures you saw, take
 the time to find out more,
 for example why they were
 built or how they work. Next
 time you visit you could try
 to spot some of the wildlife
 living in our buildings and
 structures too.
