Keeping history alive

The explosion in demand for coal and other raw materials in the Potteries revealed serious limitations of Brindley's original narrow tunnel and a second, larger tunnel was commissioned. Telford's tunnel took three years to complete and cost £113,000 (equivalent to £10.5m today).


In the early days the two tunnels were used in conjunction with each tunnel taking boat traffic in opposite directions, drastically reducing journey times.

5 things to do at Harecastle Tunnel

Stroll along the towpath to turnover bridge, built so horses could pass from one side of the canal to the other without being unhitched

Visit Westport Lake, it's an important overwintering site for water birds.

- **3 Enjoy** a 45-minute scenic walk and explore the green route linking the Harecastle Tunnel portals.
- **4 Have** a picnic at the benches just before the tunnel and watch narrowboats coming and going.

5 Pause for a chat with our friendly volunteers, they'll tell you more about the canal.

Did you know?

Harecastle Tunnel is actually two separate but parallel tunnels. The first was built by James Brindley in 1777, the second was designed by Thomas Telford and opened fifty years later in 1827.
