Keeping history alive

Often referred to as the 'heart of the waterways', Braunston has always been a focal point of the canal network. For over 150 years, the village thrived on the canal trade and many well-known freight-carrying companies were based here including Pickfords, Fellows Moreton & Clayton, Nurses, Barlows and Willow Wren, all of who transported goods between the Midlands and London.

Today you can still find a number of waterway-related businesses including day-boat trips, chandlers, boat builders and fitters, brokers and marinas.



5 things to do at Braunston

- 1 Take a stroll along the towpath past the marina to Braunston Tunnel – there's no towpath through the tunnel so boats needed to be 'legged'.
- 2 Enjoy a coffee and watch the colourful canal boats making their way through the locks.
- **3** Find the Stop House where tolls were collected the charges were based on the amount of cargo carried.

- 4 Admire the quirky canal bridges including the famous iron turnover bridge its ingenious design meant horses didn't have to be unhitched when the towpath changed sides.
- 5 Visit All Saints Church in Braunston, also known as the Boatman's Church, where many boaters have been christened, married or buried.

Did you know?

In 1923 a canal boatmans' strike took place at Braunston in response to a 6.5% cut in wages. This was one of the first disputes to involve the recently created Transport and General Workers Union (TGWU).
