


All about Ducks



Blackish with a red and yellow beak. When out of the water, look for their long, green legs.




Swan

A very large white bird with a flexible 'S' shaped neck. It sleeps with its head facing backwards tucked under its wings.

Find these words hidden in the grid. Search up, down, forwards, backwards and diagonally. The letters left in the grid will spell the name of this large waterway bird.



Ducks come in a huge variety of sizes, shapes and colours. On this bookmark you can go wild and colour in your very own wacky duck.

What's your favourite colour for its bill?

Did you know?

- Ducks' feet never get cold because they don't have nerves in them
- To turn, a duck paddles more strongly on one side, like we do when rowing a boat
- Some ducks dive completely underwater for their food. Other ducks are dabblers and feed by tipping headfirst into the water

When you're out exploring our canals and rivers you're bound to bump into some delightful ducks. But did you know white bread is their version of junk food? Treat them to these healthy snacks instead.

Sweetcorn Ducks are very fond of sweetcorn. Tinned, fresh and frozen (defrosted, of course) are great.

Lettuce When the lettuce leaves in your fridge are past their best, don't put them in the bin. Tear them into pieces and treat the ducks instead.

Peas They don't need to be cooked - just defrost them before you head out.

Oats Rolled oats and even instant porridge oats are always a huge hit with ducks.

Rice Treat the ducks to a real banquet with leftover rice from your takeaway or uncooked rice from your store cupboard.

Seeds Ducks love bird seed and the seeds from the healthy aisle in the supermarket. Seeds don't always float so it's best to scatter them in shallow water or on the ground.



Six to spot

Male ducks are usually more colourful than females, which makes them easier to identify. You probably won't see these six ducks all at the same time so keep looking whenever you go to a canal or river. Tick the box when you see one.



Goldeneye

This duck likes to dive. Males are black and white with a green head and a golden eye.



Mandarin

The male has orange feathers on the side of its face and bright orange 'sails' on its back.



Pochard

Normally it has a bright reddish-brown head, a black breast and tail and a pale grey body but in summer it turns mainly brown.



Teal

This small dabbling duck has a chestnut coloured head with broad green eye-patches and a spotted chest.



Tufted

A medium-sized black diving duck with white sides, a feathered crest on its head and yellow eyes.



Wigeon

This duck visits the UK from Iceland and Russia in winter. Its head and neck are brown, with a yellow forehead, pink breast and grey body.

CANAL COLLAGE
